## Shepperton Division 3/4 – Risk Management Plan

The Sharks will run a division 3/4 slalom at Shepperton Weir using the facilities of Shepperton Slalom Canoe Club who have sole use of a weir pool which is used for training and competitions.

The club house and land-based part of the slalom is situated on an island which is reached by crossing the Shepperton lock gates. The route is marked as private and is shared with the Thames Environment Agency (who are not there at weekends) and a boat club (motor cruisers). There is a second island which is accessed via a weir bridge and this has residents. The residents also have right of way alongside the slalom area. Paths are level and mostly paved.

Canoeing is regarded as an "at risk" sport and individuals participating recognise this either when signing for bibs and/or when entering the event. Following this document cannot remove all the associated risks; if we attempted to do so there would be no competition. Rather, we are attempting to recognise and reduce risks where we can.
